Exam Pass Rates-

The USU Marriage and Family Therapy Program have successfully graduated 79 of 84 students in the last fourteen years. Of those that have graduated, 100% have passed the national exam required for licensure. It is our hope that your experience in the USU Marriage and Family Therapy Program is challenging, enjoyable, and effective in helping you to define and achieve your personal and professional goals.

Licensure Rates-

Our goal is for our graduates to become fully licensed as marriage and family therapists within four years of graduation. Since 2005, 77.8% of our graduates have become licensed MFTs. In addition, all those still within the four year time frame are actively working towards licensure.

Employment and Achievement of Alumni-

In addition to being committed to the educational success of our students, the USU MFT program also works to prepare students to continue their educational or career goals after graduation. Currently, 92.9% of our graduates who choose to seek employment are employed within six months of graduation.

Admissions Policies –

Please note that there are two steps to our MFT admission process:

1. Application, letter of intent, and other materials sent to the graduate school
2. Email the MFT essay, resume, and photo (optional) to the MFT Staff Assistant

Applicants must have:

- Bachelor's degree from an accredited university or college
- Evidence of ability to do graduate work

Prerequisites for admission to the master's program include

- Undergraduate course in statistics (e.g., [Psychology 2800](#) or [Sociology 3120](#))
- Undergraduate course in social science research methods (e.g., [FCHD 3130](#))

In addition, candidates who have the following courses will have special consideration

- Abnormal psychology or psychopathology
- Human sexuality
- Undergraduate course in family therapy theories or family intervention

The following items will be assessed and are needed for consideration:

- GRE or MAT scores (GRE must be above 40% for Verbal and Quantitative)
(Mat must be above 40% for Percentile for Total Group)
- Undergraduate GPA
- Transcripts
- An application and letter of intent to the Graduate School
- A separate written MFT essay to the MFT program
- Three letters of reference (2 must be from former professors)
- An interview

Applications must be received by December 20th of each year for matriculation in the fall. Application is now accomplished online. For information and procedures, please go to the School of Graduate Studies web-site.

Criteria for Entering the Clinical Program-

The following items will be assessed and are needed for consideration:

- GRE or MAT scores
- Undergraduate GPA

- Transcripts
- An application and letter of intent to the Graduate School
- A separate written MFT essay to the MFT program
- Three letters of reference (2 must be from former professors)
- An interview

Applications must be received by December 20th of each year for matriculation in the fall. Application is now accomplished online. For information and procedures, please go to the School of Graduate Studies [application procedures](#).

Interviews are typically held in late February or early March.

- Email the MFT essay, resume, and photo (optional) separately to the MFT Staff Assistant; do not send them to the Graduate School.
- Send all other materials to the Graduate School including transcripts and letters of reference.

Academic Offerings-

The education you earn at USU in the Marriage and Family Therapy Program will provide you with the basic educational and clinical training experiences necessary for Associate Membership in the American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy (AAMFT) and for licensing as an Associate MFT (LAMFT) in the state of Utah. After you graduate, Utah state law requires that you practice therapy under appropriate supervision as part of your advanced training requirements in preparation for licensure. These requirements typically take 2-4 years to complete and include face-to-face clinical experience and face-to-face supervision experience plus passing the national MFT examination.

Policies with respect to Satisfactory Academic Progress-

Because it is our priority to train competent marriage and family therapists, academic progress and clinical competence is regularly monitored. In addition to key assignments that are given as part of courses, you will meet at the end of each semester with your practicum supervisor to discuss areas of strength as well as areas for improvement. You also will meet at the end of each academic year with the program director to receive feedback as well as provide feedback of how the program can better meet your needs.

Student Achievement-

The USU MFT program is committed to helping its students gain an identity as marriage and family therapists. That includes attending and presenting at state and national conferences. All six of our 2nd year students attended the AAMFT National conference in Indianapolis, Indiana in 2016. Two student presented on their research while finishing their thesis.
